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The following is the local educational agency's (LEA's) plan for providing supplemental instruction and support to students, including those identified as needing academic, social-emotional, and other supports, including the provision of meals and snacks. Plan Descriptions

Parents and students were given a survey and opportunities to attend and discussions/meetings with school personnel to provide input. The survey specifically asked for stakeholder feedback for all seven supplemental instruction and support strategies. Based upon responses provided, four identified areas categories: mitigating learning loss, students' social/emotional/mental health, and provided key topics.

This survey was tied to RVCS's LCAP and specifically addressed questions pertaining to learning loss, which is a primary focus of the school's for the 2021-2022 school year.

Staff input has been gathered over the course of the school year through staff meetings of the whole staff and department meetings.

A description of how students will be identified and the needs of students will be assessed.

For academic support, MAP Growth assessments will be used in addition to input from teachers, the counselor, and the principal, to assess the needs of students. The MAP Growth assessments as well as teacher-created assessments will identify the need for targeted academic intervention, and teachers will provide input based on student outcomes in their classes.

For counseling support pertaining to social/emotional wellbeing of students and graduation guidance, the counselor will communicate with the entire student population as well as parents/guardians to explain the help and support provided by the counseling department. Based upon this initial communication, the counselor will provide direct services to the students needing support. The counselor will also use input from the teachers, the campus supervisor, the principal, paraprofessionals, and parent communications to reach out to students if staff members and/or parents express an identified need for which the student needs support.

A description of how parents and guardians of students will be informed of the opportunities for supplemental instruction and support.

The school will inform parents and guardians of students about opportunities for supplemental instruction and support through multiple means. For very specific targeted intervention, the student's teacher(s) will meet with the parent/guardian and student to discuss the results of the MAP Growth assessments and to explain why targeted interventions are needed. Information will also be sent home in the student's home language explaining the rationale for the targeted interventions. In discussing the interventions, a plan will be developed to ensure the parent/guardian and student understand the objectives of the interventions. Time frames will be established so benchmark data can be collected to determine student progress and the need for continued interventions. Since these interventions will be specific to the identified student's academic needs, it will be communicated to parents/guardians that these interventions will continue until the student reaches the level of achievement necessary for academic success.

RVCS will communicate available services by posting information on the River Valley Charter School website and disseminating it to students and parents via email.

A description of the LEA's plan to provide supplemental instruction and support.

During the current 20-21 school year, students experiencing learning loss have been identified using multiple measures including MAP Growth assessments, adopted curriculum assessments, and informal assessments measuring proficiency and mastery of identified grade level standards. Using this information, students receive targeted small group intervention with credentialed teachers and additional support from academic tutors. Some students will attend school 4 days per week to receive intervention instruction. All students will have access to after school intervention in the 21-22 school year and others will be able to participate in afterschool enrichment. For some students, virtual learning has been a great opportunity this school year and for these students, it has been an environment in which they are thriving. RVCS will continue to offer a full-time independent study program for students to attend the 21-22 school year under our River Valley Academy, our home-based program. For students opting to remain in this program, both

virtual and in-person support will be provided to these students to help support their academic success. In the 21-22 school year, we will offer increased instructional aide support to facilitate more targeted small group instruction. All paraprofessionals will receive specialized training and professional development to support student academic and social emotional success.

By expanding our school’s community partnerships to include mental health services, we will be better equipped to mitigate mental health and other barriers to learning, and support students while they work towards mastery in grade level standards. Students will receive support through Social Emotional Learning curriculum and lessons. These services will be provided in an engaging and positive school climate. Certificated and classified staff will receive professional development training and support in trauma informed care and social emotional learning. Technology to support these services will also be updated and increased.

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A description of how ELO Grant funds are being coordinated with other federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds received by the LEA.

River Valley Charter School is coordinating the use of the Expanded Learning Grant and federal ESSER funds by budgeting all of these one-time funding sources across several categories to meet the needs of the students, staff, and community. The ESSER funds are budgeted towards technology. This technology is necessary to ensure students have the requisite equipment needed to address their learning needs. In 2021-22, the Expanded Learning Grant funds are primarily budgeted towards extending instructional learning time and services to close the learning gap. RVCS will work to provide better access to technology, high-speed internet and other academic supports. The school will hire paraprofessionals for extra support along with implementing supports to address mental health and other barriers to learning. RVCS will use diagnostics to pinpoint what intervention materials, programs, and curriculum are needed to close the gaps along with a focus on SEL curriculum. Staff members will engage in meaningful professional development to ensure students are receiving instruction intervention based on individual needs.

Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant Plan Instructions: Introduction

Instructions: Plan Requirements

An LEA receiving ELO Grant funds under *EC* Section 43521(b) is required to implement a learning recovery program that, at a minimum, provides supplemental instruction, support for social and emotional well-being, and, to the maximum extent permissible under the guidelines of the United States Department of Agriculture, meals and snacks to, at a minimum, students who are included in one or more of the following groups:

- low-income,
- English learners,
- foster youth,
- homeless students,
- students with disabilities,
- students at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation,
- disengaged students, and
- students who are below grade level, including, but not limited to, those who did not enroll in kindergarten in the 2020–21 school year, credit-deficient students, high school students at risk of not graduating, and other students identified by certificated staff.

For purposes of this requirement

- “Supplemental instruction” means the instructional programs provided in addition to and complementary to the LEAs regular instructional programs, including services provided in accordance with an individualized education program (IEP).
- “Support” means interventions provided as a supplement to those regularly provided by the LEA, including services provided in accordance with an IEP, that are designed to meet students’ needs for behavioral, social, emotional, and other integrated student supports, in order to enable students to engage in, and benefit from, the supplemental instruction being provided.

- “Students at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation” means students who are identified as being at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation in a written referral from a legal, medical, or social service agency, or emergency shelter.

EC Section 43522(b) identifies the seven supplemental instruction and support strategies listed below as the strategies that may be supported with ELO Grant funds and requires the LEA to use the funding only for any of these purposes. LEAs are not required to implement each supplemental instruction and support strategy; rather LEAs are to work collaboratively with their community partners to identify the supplemental instruction and support strategies that will be implemented. LEAs are encouraged to engage, plan, and collaborate on program operation with community partners and expanded learning programs, and to leverage existing behavioral health partnerships and Medi-Cal billing options in the design and implementation of the supplemental instruction and support strategies being provided (*EC* Section 43522[h]).

The seven supplemental instruction and support strategies are:

1. Extending instructional learning time in addition to what is required for the school year by increasing the number of instructional days or minutes provided during the school year, providing summer school or intersessional instructional programs, or taking any other action that increases the amount of instructional time or services provided to students based on their learning needs.
2. Accelerating progress to close learning gaps through the implementation, expansion, or enhancement of learning supports including, but not limited to, any of the following:
 - a. Tutoring or other one-on-one or small group learning supports provided by certificated or classified staff.
 - b. Learning recovery programs and materials designed to accelerate student academic proficiency or English language proficiency, or both.
 - c. Educator training, for both certificated and classified staff, in accelerated learning strategies and effectively addressing learning gaps, including training in facilitating quality and engaging learning opportunities for all students.
3. Integrated student supports to address other barriers to learning, such as the provision of health, counseling, or mental health services, access to school meal programs, before and after school programs, or programs to address student trauma and social-emotional learning, or referrals for support for family or student needs.
4. Community learning hubs that provide students with access to technology, high-speed internet, and other academic supports.
5. Supports for credit deficient students to complete graduation or grade promotion requirements and to increase or improve students’ college eligibility.
6. Additional academic services for students, such as diagnostic, progress monitoring, and benchmark assessments of student learning.
7. Training for school staff on strategies, including trauma-informed practices, to engage students and families in addressing students’ social-emotional health needs and academic needs.

As a reminder, *EC* Section 43522(g) requires that all services delivered to students with disabilities be delivered in accordance with an applicable IEP.

Fiscal Requirements

The following fiscal requirements are requirements of the ELO grant, but they are not addressed in this plan. Adherence to these requirements will be monitored through the annual audit process.

- The LEA must use at least 85 percent (85%) of its apportionment for expenditures related to providing in-person services in any of the seven purposes described above.
- The LEA must use at least 10 percent (10%) of the funding that is received based on LCFF entitlement to hire paraprofessionals to provide supplemental instruction and support through the duration of this program, with a priority for full-time paraprofessionals. The supplemental instruction and support provided by the paraprofessionals must be prioritized for English learners and students with disabilities. Funds expended to hire paraprofessionals count towards the LEAs requirement to spend at least 85% of its apportionment to provide in-person services.
- An LEA may use up to 15 percent (15%) of its apportionment to increase or improve services for students participating in distance learning or to support activities intended to prepare the LEA for in-person instruction, before in-person instructional services are offered.
